Bee Bits

This year reminds us of how totally bees are at the mercy of the weather! Ten days ago, I could shake fresh nectar from the combs, and thought that the flow had finally restarted. Then we got about five days of cool, wet weather during which the bees could not forage. Many colonies that were short on stores simply starved! We only lost a couple, but were out madly feeding syrup in the rain. We actually pulled off supers of foundation that we had put on in expectation of a crop, in order to get the feed to the hungry clusters!

We should be over the hump soon—the black locust is in bloom, and blackberry is already flowering at the 2000 ft level. If we get good flight weather, we stand the chance of getting a good honey crop this season. With the high moisture level in the soil, you may need to super up ahead, in order to give the bees room to process thin nectar!

Returning to unusual weather, remember our warm January? Well, that early brood rearing is now leading to higher varroa levels than normal. Be sure to keep an eye on the mite, as you may need to treat early. It's not too late for drone trapping. I wouldn't count on sugar dusting unless your mite levels are fairly low to start with. Apiguard thymol gel would be my choice, or perhaps a single Miteaway Quick Strip (half dose).

Citrus Salad with Avocado

Makes 6 servings

- 3 (6 inch) tortillas
- 4 oranges
- 4 grapefruits
- 1/3 cup honey
- 1/4 cup raspberry vinegar
- 2 Tablespoons oil
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 avocado, sliced

Preheat oven to 255°F. Slice corn tortillas into very thin strips. Dry the strips by placing on a cookie sheet and baking for approximately 15 minutes. Set aside. Peel oranges and grapefruits, then section, seed, and place in large bowl; set aside. In a small bowl, whisk together honey, raspberry vinegar, oil, and salt. Pour over citrus sections and toss gently. Top with avocado slices and tortilla strips.
